
















ABOUT THE PROGRAM

The Medal of Honor Character Development Program is an engaging, no-cost, character-based curriculum designed by teachers to provide students with the opportunity to explore the important concepts of courage, commitment, sacrifice, patriotism, integrity and citizenship and how these values can be exemplified in daily life. Lessons and activities focus on a wide range of subjects and show how everyday people can make a difference.

Separate elementary and secondary resources provide lessons appropriate for grades
Kindergarten through 12 and beyond.
Assignments and activities fit efficiently into existing disciplines, time periods, and schedules.
Each lesson highlights skills such as writing, collaboration, and critical thinking. For all ages and circumstances, the overriding message is that every person has within the capacity to be a hero.



WHO WE REPRESENT

MEDAL OF HONOR

The Medal of Honor is the United States' highest award for military valor in action. First signed into law in 1861 during the Civil War, the Medal of Honor has fewer than 3600 Recipients. The Medal is a distinguished award, presented to those who have shown gallantry and intrepidity, at the risk of their lives, above and beyond the call of duty. The stories and values of these Medal of Honor Recipients form the core of the Character Development Program.

CITIZEN HONORS

These awards honor ordinary people whose acts of courage and self-sacrifice symbolize the American spirit. Through Citizen Honors, Medal of Honor Recipients recognize civilians and organizations for their extraordinary actions. Several lessons in the Character Development Program focus on these heroes.

CONGRESSIONAL MEDAL OF HONOR SOCIETY

Chartered by Congress in 1958, the Congressional Medal of Honor Society's membership is comprised of those who wear the Medal of Honor. The Society is dedicated to preserving the legacy of the Medal of Honor and its Recipients, inspiring America's youth and its Veterans, and supporting the Recipients as they connect with communities across the country.

WHY THIS PROGRAM IS UNIQUE

The lessons feature extraordinary military and civilian stories, providing students examples to live by and concrete, real life applications of values that can otherwise be abstract.

ELEMENTARY RESOURCE

Lessons separated by grade level to match expected student skills and learning objectives and empower children with self-confidence.
