Adolphus Greely, U.S. Army, Louisiana (In 1881 commanded the Lady Franklin Expedition to the Arctic)

Thomas J. Ryan, Jr., U.S. Navy, New Orleans, LA (Peacetime, rescued a woman from a burning hotel in Japan, 1923)

Albert Weisbogel, U.S. Navy, New Orleans, LA (Double recipient during peacetime, saving crew members from drowning)
