HOW WE STARTED:

Beginning in 2007, a group of teachers and administrators in Pennsylvania, funded by a grant from the GE Foundation, created the lessons that would become the Character Development Program. The initial lessons were formally launched in 2009, and the elementary resource was added in 2016.

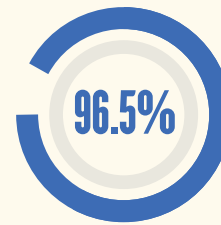




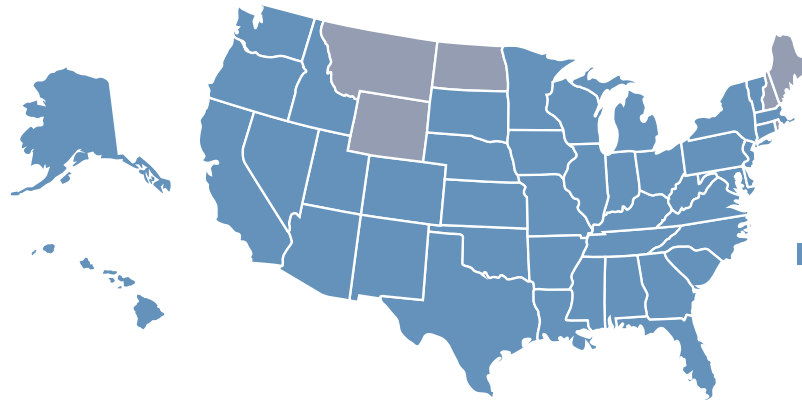
